Historic England has no objection to this proposed boundary; however we would like to take the opportunity of your consultation to raise the following issues setting out the support</p>	Comment noted.

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			<p>Historic England is able to offer in relation to Neighbourhood Plans.</p> <p>The area identified by the Barmby Moor Parish Council for the Neighbourhood Plan includes a number of important designated heritage assets, including the Manor House and the Church of St Catherine (both listed Grade II*), a Scheduled Monument, described as a “Rectilinear Enclosure” and Grade II Listed Buildings, as well as Barmby Moor Conservation Area. Please find attached a map and schedule of all designated heritage assets in the Parish.</p> <p>The East Riding of Yorkshire Council and East Riding Archaeology’s Historic Environment Record should be able to provide details of all designations, or alternatively, information can be found at the Heritage List for England website: http://list.HistoricEngland.org.uk.</p> <p>Additionally, your attention is drawn to the Heritage At Risk Register 2015 for Yorkshire and the Humber which may itemise heritage assets which are “At Risk” in the Barmby Moor Parish Council Neighbourhood Plan Area.</p> <p>Research has clearly demonstrated that local people value their heritage and Neighbourhood Plans are a positive way to help them manage it. Historic England wants to support you in helping communities protect what they care about.</p>	

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			<p>Historic England is expecting that as Neighbourhood Planning Forums such as Barmby Moor Parish Council come to you to seek advice on preparing Neighbourhood Plans they will value advice on how best to understand what heritage they have and assistance on preparing appropriate policies.</p> <p>Information held by the Council and used in the preparation of your Local Plan is often the starting point for Neighbourhood Plans. Other useful information may be available from the Historic Environment Record Centres or local environmental and amenity groups. Historic England also publishes a wide range of relevant guidance. Links to these can be found in the appendix to this letter.</p> <p>Plan preparation also offers the opportunity to harness a community's interest in the historic environment by getting them to help add to the evidence base, perhaps by creating and or reviewing a local heritage list, inputting to the preparation of conservation area appraisals and undertaking historic characterisation surveys. Historic England has a statutory role in the development plan process and there is a duty on either you as the Local Planning Authority or the Neighbourhood Planning Forums to consult Historic England on any Neighbourhood Plan</p>	

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			<p>where our interests are considered to be affected as well as a duty to consult us on all Neighbourhood Development Orders and Community Right to Build Orders. Should a Strategic Environmental Assessment/Sustainability Appraisal be required we again have a formal role in that process.</p> <p>Historic England will target its limited resources efficiently. We will directly advise on proposals with the potential for major change to significant, nationally important heritage assets and their settings. Our local office may also advise communities where they wish to engage directly with us, subject to local priorities and capacity. Of course the nature of the locally-led neighbourhood plan process is that the community itself should determine its own agenda based on the issues it is concerned about. At the same time, as a national organisation able increasingly to draw upon our experiences of neighbourhood planning exercises across the country, our input, agreed on a case by case basis, can help those communities reflect upon the special (heritage) qualities which define their area to best ensure that optimum and sustainable outcomes are achieved.
